They can also be used to provide matching money for grants from LCIF. The grants are for up to \$9,999. LCIF grants start at \$10,000. As a 501-C3 foundation, it is looking for donation to build to body of the fund. MD-4 has donated \$5,000 to help start this. If you can help, it would be appreciated. Additionally, requests for grants can be forwarded to me for approval by the foundation. I will be serving on the board as the director from District 4-A3 for the remainder of the year.

I will be working with Gov. Jose and 1st VDG Norm to develop stronger leadership in the clubs and district. With it, we hope to increase membership to strengthen our clubs and be able to provide more service in our communities. I get excited when I hear of new projects being established by our clubs. In this, our centennial year, this is a great time to create a new project that will leave a legacy in your community as a result of your club's efforts.

If you have problems, questions, or need assistance, I will try to make myself available to your club. I hope that our journey together will be filled with success and fun. I hope to see more of you on our journey through the district, at district, region, and zone meetings. Join with me a "be a partner in service".

Dear Lions of District A-3,

I hope I'm not too presumptuous if I make some recommendations on how to have a "perfect club." Ask yourself, would I join my club? I think most of us know we can make our clubs better, but we just get complacent. It isn't rocket science, and some simple steps can make our clubs so much better.



First, Lions don't talk to each other. How are we going to get better if we don't talk about how we can improve and change? The best way to do this is to have a retreat with a facilitator to guide the discussion. The club can then come up with a plan to succeed. At the minimum, clubs should set aside time each year to talk about the health of the club and how to get better. Talk to me as your GLT Coordinator.

Second, ask the question - are we doing service projects? They key here is are your projects fundraisers and not service projects? Lions join to do service and too many clubs think fundraisers are service, but they are not. Lions need to do service. It is how we connect with the community. Service is how we as Lions feel good about what we do. My opinion is that every club needs to do a service project at least once a quarter. If your club is not, look to put service back into your club.

Most importantly, we need to grow as clubs. The majority of clubs have little or no membership activity. We know we need more "hands and hearts," but we just don't do anything about it. Our projects are our best recruiting tool. Why not ask members to invite prospects to projects? They'll see what you do and the fun you have together. Try it! They'll join.

I'm also shocked how seldom we use our projects as public relations. Why not have a "brag board" at every event? Put Lions information on it and pictures about what you do. Every event should have brochures and a Lion prepared to talk to prospects about joining us. What about a sign that says "Ask me about Lions?" People in the community are interested in service. Try something new, you'll be surprised at your success.

If your club is struggling, why not ask for help? Your Zone Chair, Region Chair and District GMT and GLT are more than happy to help! Why not start today, to make your Club the "Perfect Club?" There is no better time.

First District Meeting of MD4-A3 is a

Roaring Success — Region I Chair ~Lion Don Bock



District Governor Jose Nichols and Region I hosted the First District Meeting and Cabinet Installation of MD4-A3 over two days; August 26 and August 27 in Santa Maria. With the Santa Maria Sunrisers taking the lead in putting on the event, Vandenberg Village Lions Club provided the most integral element-Lion Ann McCarty who served as emcee and Tail Twister. Zone Chair Ann carried out her role with great aplomb.

On Friday, August 26th, DG Jose's cabinet was installed at the beautiful Presqu'ile Winery to a backdrop of evening sun setting over the hills in Santa

Maria. With numerous dignitaries, including several Past District Governors, Past and present Council Chairs and Club officers in attendance, the affair was one to remember for the 70 plus Lions and guests. After a tasty meal of tri-

tip steak and chicken prepared by Matt Dwyer and his staff accompanied by Presqu'ile wines, ID Howard Hudson and Lion Lynn Hudson performed the installation. ID Howard cleverly used the Centennial theme of Feeding the Hungry to frame up his presentation. Each of the cabinet officers was presented with a food item that should remind them of their roles in the coming year. Items such as A-1, yeast, and flour were presented to the officers in hopes of growing MD4-A3 during the 2016-2017 Lion year. Each officer accepted their role and committed to growing Lions in the Multiple District and assuming leadership positions that make a difference. The evening concluded with dancing and socializing.

On the following morning, the officers reconvened for the First District Meeting at the Historic Santa Maria Inn. After conducting normal business and introductions, Lion Don Greenberg shared with the group information about the Ventura Collective project in which several clubs have collaborated. The purpose of the Collective Project is to provide vision assistance and care to infants. The group is also looking to expand the Project to include adults. Afterward the attendees were treated to a presentation by PDG Ken Echeberry, entitled Bullets, Beans and Band aids. In the presentation, PDG Ken covered the elements of leadership integral to growing leaders and clubs. He pointed out that for a leader to be successful, he or she must seek first to understand, then to be understood. This is one of the basic tenets of leadership. We cannot lead if we cannot listen. PDG Ken also shared with the group a Power-Point presentation demonstrating the capabilities of the Lions Camp at Teresita Pines. He showed several of the original cabins and facilities both in the past as in the present to show how the camp has grown to accommodate more groups.









Nipomo Lions Help Food Bank Distributed Food

Nipomo Lions have been doing a monthly food distribution at Dana Elementary school since Sept. 2013 with food provided by the Food Bank, which includes a bag of USDA dry goods and usually a package of frozen meat plus a bag of locally donated and/or purchased produce and other items, which may include bread, juice, eggs, milk, or various other items. Nipomo Lions provides the labor, usually with about a dozen volunteers, often including some of the high school Leo club members, and serve as many as 192 families each month. Many of the same families who need assistance come each month as well as new families as the need throughout the community grows. The program at this site started with enough food to serve an initial number of 80 families and the numbers have grown to a high of 192 families. The distribution occurs in the parking lot at Dana Elementary, 920 W. Tefft St. from 4 - 6p on the 4th Tuesday of every month and helps a number of people who may not be able to stretch their food budget through the month.

According to Lynn McGill, Lions Chairperson for this project: we have handed out over 5,000 food allotments since we started in 2013.
